



INTRODUCTION

For several years Cumberland Trail Genealogical Society has been working on a Cemetery Documentation Project to locate and document cemeteries throughout Belmont County. This book is the culmination of that project. We realize we have not found all the known cemeteries in the county. We also realize we will never locate all of them. For that reason, we chose to publish our results in the belief that you will find this guide helpful in your cemetery searches. Additional found cemeteries may be added in an addendum sometime in the future.

Our primary source for cemetery information was the WPA Cemetery Plat Book in the Recorder's Office at the Belmont County Courthouse. This Plat Book was prepared in 1938-1939 and contains references to 188 cemeteries in Belmont County. It was invaluable, but it did have one major flaw: the locations of the cemeteries were vague. So although we found very helpful information, such as names of veterans buried in the cemeteries, we had much work in store physically locating many of these cemeteries. All have not been found, and many of them may no longer exist.

When we refer to cemeteries, this means anything from thousands of graves in one of our many large cemeteries to one lone grave in a forest. In some instances all physical indications of a cemetery may be gone, but the information is included for historic purposes.

We especially wanted to find small abandoned cemeteries before they were completely gone, so the burial sites could be recorded for future generations.

In recent years, it has become popular again to bury loved ones on the family property rather than in an established cemetery. We have sought out private cemetery owners who have allowed us to document their cemeteries for inclusion in this book. Please honor their privacy by not visiting them unless for a specific personal connection to the family.

An Expanded Version of <u>Your Guide to the Cemeteries of Belmont County, Ohio</u> is being prepared for use in the Research Room at St. Clairsville Public Library. In addition to the information contained in this book, the Expanded Version will be in notebook form and will include color cemetery photographs, color topographical maps, tombstone transcriptions prepared by CTGS members and friends, and any other information relevant to a specific cemetery. Additionally, we are preparing a CD of cemetery photographs (one per cemetery) that will be available for purchase in 2005.

We encourage you to obtain a Belmont County map to aid you in locating these cemeteries. If you live in the area or are in the area on a weekday, please go to the Engineer's Office at the Belmont County Courthouse and request one free map. This will be invaluable to you in following our directions and obtaining an overview of the county and its sixteen townships.

Information in this guide has been compiled as accurately as possible. However, we know some errors and incorrect information may have slipped in. We ask for your indulgence for the occasional error as we cannot guarantee complete accuracy.

We hope this guide inspires you to seek out cemeteries and enjoy their beauty and history.

Each cemetery documentation page contains the same categories. Below are descriptions of each category.

Cemetery: As we used the WPA Plat Book as our primary source, the WPA name is listed first. Misspellings have been noted and corrected.

Reference Number: This number will appear on all documents relating to a specific cemetery. For example, this number will appear on the Township Map, Township Cemetery List, and Cemetery Documentation Page in this book. It will also be used in the Expanded Version of this book, as well as on a large Belmont County Map that will be in the Research Room.

Also Known As: This category will list all known alternate names for a cemetery.

Township: This will indicate in which of Belmont County's sixteen townships the cemetery is located.

Nearby Town: This is the town from which directions to the cemetery originate.

USGS Topo Map: United States Geological Survey Topographical Maps are detailed maps that may be obtained in many map stores or from the U.S. Geological Survey. Belmont County falls within the following quadrangles, which are named for one of the towns within the quadrangle: Armstrong, Barnesville, Bethesda, Businessburg, Cameron, Dillonvale, Fairview, Flushing, Harrisville, Hunter, Lansing, Powhatan Point, St. Clairsville, Tiltonsville and Wheeling.

Land Survey Code: Belmont County is part of the "Seven Ranges" which was the system established to survey the first public lands in the United States. This land survey system is comprised of Ranges, Townships, Sections and Quarters of Sections. Ranges run from east to west with Belmont County falling within Ranges 2 through 6. Township Numbers run from south to north with Belmont County falling within Township Numbers 4 through 10. The Ranges and Township Numbers form a square block comprised of 36 Sections. If you are unfamiliar with this system, it sounds more complicated than it is. All Ranges, Township Numbers and Sections are shown on Belmont County maps. Once you find the correct Section (which covers one square mile), you can then search for the northeast, northwest, southeast or southwest quarter of the section to more precisely pinpoint a location. Property deeds describe locations using R-T-S-1/4 indicating Range-Township-Section-Quarter of a Section.

GPS Coordinates: Global Position System Coordinates pinpoint the exact latitude and longitude of a location based upon positioning from satellites. Belmont County falls within Latitudes 39° and 40° North and Longitudes 80° and 81° West. Once these positions are recorded, even if the cemetery is gone, at least there will be an accurate record of where it was located.

WPA Plat Book: If the cemetery is listed in the WPA Plat Book, this category will indicate the Plat Book page number that shows the cemetery.

Approximate Size: The cemetery size is estimated in fractions of an acre. If it is in the WPA Plat Book, that acreage is used, unless otherwise noted.

Approximate Date: The date of a cemetery's founding is frequently an estimated date. We use the earliest date found for the cemetery. This date may be from the WPA Plat Book, oldest tombstones still legible, oldest tombstone from an early tombstone transcription or other record.

Transcription: Tombstone transcription references are abbreviated as described below.

BCC: Belmont County Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society – three notebooks containing cemetery transcriptions. The Chapter acknowledges these records came from numerous sources and does not guarantee their accuracy. However, they are very helpful and provide many leads.

BC Ext: <u>Belmont County History of Facts and Traditions 1965-1989</u> by Belmont County Extension Homemakers Council and Citizen Committee.

CTGS: Tombstone transcriptions prepared by members and friends of Cumberland Trail Genealogical Society will be included in the Expanded Version of this book that will be available in the Research Room of the St. Clairsville Public Library.

Condition: All cemeteries were documented or revisited in 2003 and 2004 to check on the current condition of the cemetery and to record the GPS Coordinates.


Accessibility: This indicates how easy it is for the average person to get to the cemetery.

Directions: The directions are from a nearby town to a cemetery following main roads when available.

Comments: Our goal was to provide some interesting or unusual information on each cemetery.

PRIVATE PROPERTY - OBTAIN PERMISSION: You will find this notation on many of the smaller cemeteries. For reasons of privacy, ownership of cemeteries is not included in this book. In most instances, if you ask a nearby property owner, he/she will be the cemetery owner or will know who the owner is.

Pleasant Grove Cemetery

Also Known As: Holly View Cemetery, Pleasant Grove Methodist Protestant Church Cemetery

Common Names: Babbs, Beck, Hughes, Mercer, Oxley, Stillwell

Condition: Good. Some tombstones need repair.

Accessibility: Good

Directions: Start in Pleasant Grove at the intersection of US 250 (Pleasant Grove Road) and CR 5 (Crescent Pleasant Grove Road). Take US 250 west about 0.2 mile to TR 452 (Donely Road / Holly View Drive). Turn left onto TR 452 and go about 0.1 mile. The cemetery is on the right.

Comments: A Methodist Protestant Church was built on this site in 1852. A wooden sidewalk was installed between the church and cemetery so people could travel between the two without getting muddy. The church is long gone. The cemetery, with a small pine tree in the middle, is up a short bank at a curve in the road.

Accessibility: Very good

Directions: Start in Pleasant Grove at the intersection of US 250 (Pleasant Grove Road) and CR 5 (Crescent Pleasant Grove Road). Take US 250 east about 0.1 mile. The cemetery entrance is on the right.

Comments: This is a large cemetery with cemetery lanes throughout and a mausoleum on the east side. Until 2004, all graves had flat grass markers. A new section named Heritage Garden was recently opened for monuments. There are over 10,000 burials.

Condition: Poor. Weedy and tree covered with two tombstones.

Accessibility: Very easy. A few feet from main road.

Directions: Start in Colerain at the intersection of SR 250 (Colerain Road) and TR 475 (Colerain Mt. Pleasant Road). Take TR 475 north about 0.7 mile. You will see a small grove of trees on the right side of the road with a two-car garage and house beside the trees. The cemetery is in this small grove of trees. The two tombstones can be seen from the road.

Comments: Joshua Maule, a Quaker, moved to Ohio in 1831. He built a meeting house in 1864 (Maulite) which lasted only a few years. He also had a general store in "Mauletown" (now Colerain), where he was the postmaster. He and his wife are buried adjacent to the site of that first meeting house. PRIVATE PROPERTY. Transcription: Believed no tombstones ever existed.

Common Names: Believed to be Milhous.

Condition: Poor. Overgrown with trees.

Accessibility: Difficult. Requires walking through high weeds and thorn bushes.

Directions: Start in Colerain at the intersection of SR 250 (Colerain Road) and TR 475 (Colerain Mt. Pleasant Road). Take TR 475 north about 0.4 mile and turn right into a private lane. Go to the last house on the lane and follow a path behind the house which leads downhill into a stream. Cross the stream and go up the other bank to a flat place covered with trees. This area is 100 feet east of the remains of a spring house and is believed to be the location of this burial ground, per a statement in a local history report.

Comments: The Milhouses were a strict Quaker family and as such never had tombstones in the cemetery. The Milhous property was believed to be a stop on the Underground Railroad. One of their descendants is President Richard Milhous Nixon. A present day descendent came to Belmont County about 25 years ago in search of the burial location and other genealogical information. Local residents assisted him and remain in contact. PRIVATE PROPERTY. OBTAIN PERMISSION.

Common Names: Brackin, Bundy, Hall, Negus, Starbuck, Steer

Condition: Very good

Accessibility: Fair. You cannot safely drive into the cemetery, as it is at a sharp turn which could present a dangerous situation.

Directions: Start in Colerain at the intersection of US 250 (Colerain Road) and TR 475 (Colerain Mt. Pleasant Road). Take TR 475 north about 0.2 mile. The cemetery is at a sharp curve on the left side of the road. Park on the right side of the road wherever you can find a safe spot.

Comments: The cemetery has very old tombstones, and it has an iron fence around it. The Grange Meeting House was built in 1868 and sat next to the cemetery, but it was later moved across the road and is now a residence. There were several divisions in the Quaker faith. This meeting house was Wilburite. The cemetery is near the former Grange Hall, which was originally a Quaker School.

Accessibility: Good

Directions: Start in Colerain at the intersection of US 250 (Colerain Road) and CR 4 (Colerain Martins Ferry Road). Take CR 4 east about 0.75 mile to TR 456 (Negus Road). Turn left onto TR 456 and go about 0.5 mile. The cemetery is on the right.

Comments: The grave of Josiah Fox is located in this cemetery. He was the naval architect of the USS Constitution (Old Ironsides). Josiah Fox served as a naval architect for fifteen years under Presidents Washington, Adams, Jefferson and Madison. He and his wife, Anna Miller, had ten children. The cemetery is completely fenced. Within the fence is a boarded up brick building with the following sign above the door, "Society of Friends Concord Meeting House Circa 1813 rebuilt 1898." Concord Quaker Cemetery is on the sign beside the cemetery. It is said that ex-slaves are buried in the back section of the cemetery, mostly in unmarked graves. Strict Quaker graves are also unmarked.

Condition: Poor. All the stones are at low ground level and difficult to find.

Accessibility: Difficult

Directions: Start in Colerain at the intersection of US 250 (Colerain Road) and CR 4 (Colerain Martins Ferry Road). Take CR 4 east about 0.75 mile to TR 456 (Negus Road). Turn left onto TR 456 and go about 0.5 mile to Berry/Concord Cemetery. Continue on CR 456 about another 0.2 mile and turn right onto a dirt lane. Travel about 0.5 mile on the lane, and when traversing a wide turn, follow a farm lane that branches off to the right through a hay field. Follow this farm lane until you come to the edge of the woods. Park here and walk in about 0.5 mile. The cemetery is on the left.

Comments: This is the site of the original Berry Cemetery, on land owned by the Berry family. The cemetery was the first burying ground of the Friends in Ohio. The church burned down in 1813, and a new church and cemetery were established one ridge over. Unfortunately, the U.S. Geological Survey picked up the name Berry Cemetery for the new church location. The USGS cemetery name is incorrect. PRIVATE PROPERTY. OBTAIN PERMISSION.

Directions: Start in Barton at the intersection of CR 10 (Barton Blaine Road) and CR 14 (Farmington Road). Take CR 14 northeast about 0.5 mile to TR 544 (Zunick Road). Turn left onto an unnamed lane opposite TR 544. Travel about 0.3 mile to where the lane ends. There is a house on the left. The cemetery is located about another 0.2 mile further up the hill. It is possible to drive through the field to the cemetery in dry weather.

Comments: This land is the first farm on record in the township, having been purchased in 1788. The farm was sold to Abner Barton in 1814. He and his wife, Sarah, are among the people buried here. The cemetery is surrounded by a chain link fence. Beware of the dog. PRIVATE PROPERTY. OBTAIN PERMISSION.

Condition: Wooded area

Accessibility: Walk in

Directions: Start in Barton at the intersection of CR 10 (Barton Blaine Road) and CR 14 (Farmington Road). Take CR 14 northeast about 2.0 miles to TR 438 (Flat Run Road). Park near this intersection and walk south across the bridge and along CR 14. Turn left into the field after crossing the bridge. Follow the creek downstream through a pine thicket and emerge into normal woods. This is the general area. The tombstone is on the right side of the creek.

Comments: One tombstone was located in a natural grotto of stone at stream bed level. Per a Theaker relative, about 25 years ago Mr. Theaker hid the tombstone there to protect it from vandals and erosion. There may have been two tombstones originally, but the original site is unknown. It is on the old John Theaker property. John was a blacksmith in Farmington, as well as an elder in the Farmington Presbyterian Church. PRIVATE PROPERTY. OBTAIN PERMISSION.

Directions: Start in Barton at the intersection of CR 10 (Barton Blaine Road) and CR 14 (Farmington Road). Take CR 14 about 1.6 miles to TR 439 (Swingle Road). Turn right onto TR 439 and travel about 0.1 mile. The cemetery is on the right.

Comments: This cemetery has many members of the Lash family buried in it, including Abraham Lash, the first white child born in the area. There is a prominent sign in the cemetery tracing the Lash family and referencing the early Lash ancestor, Jacob Lash II, who remains buried with his wife about a mile away in Lash Cemetery.







All that remains of the cemetery are four tombstones propped around two big cherry trees. William and his wife, Rebecca, are buried here, along with Nancy Ball. However, a hand-written correction was made to the map indicating that both cemeteries were in Smith Township, which is correct. A Warnock Cemetery Trustee informed us that the northern portion of the cemetery was purchased from a coal company strip mining in the area. This purchase combined the two cemeteries. This oldest section is called the Garden of First Disciples and once had an old church within its borders. There are several old tombstones here, one which was engulfed by a large tree and split in two.



BURIAL AND MEMORIAL BENEFITS FOR VETERANS


A headstone or marker will be furnished free of charge upon request to the VA (Department of Veterans Affairs) for any deceased eligible veteran in any cemetery around the world. For deaths occurring before September 11, 2001, the marker or headstone will be provided only for graves not marked with a private headstone.

When the marker or headstone is to be placed in a national, post, or state veterans cemetery the order will be placed by the cemetery officials based on information provided by the next of kin.

Spouses and dependents buried in a private cemetery are not eligible for a Government furnished headstone or marker.

When burial is in a private cemetery the form VA 40-1330, Application for Standard Government Headstone or Marker, must be submitted by the next of kin or a representative, along with the veterans military discharge documents. Do not send original documents, as they will not be returned.

There are many veterans buried in this cemetery, including War of 1812 veteran, George Palmer, and Mexican War veteran, George Anderson. Burials also include nineteen Civil War veterans.

Comments: Joshua Tracy, a pioneer in the area, arrived in 1813 with his wife, Nancy Vaughn, and settled on the farm where he is buried. Nancy is most likely also buried here, but we did not find a tombstone. There are 12 to 15 remains of tombstones here, but most are illegible. The cemetery is in an area that was strip-mined, leaving the top of the hill intact. It is surrounded by reclaimed land used as cattle pastures. The Lee family owned land in Section 31 adjacent to the Tracy land. Hence, the name Tracy/Lee Cemetery. PRIVATE PROPERTY. OBTAIN PERMISSION.

PHOTOGRAPHING GRAVESTONES

First of all, there is no right or wrong way to photograph a gravestone. Please use these ideas as general guidelines to keep in mind as you take your photos.

The best time to go to the cemetery for photographs is on a sunny or light overcast day. The bright light is very helpful in bringing out detail. If you HAVE to go on a heavy overcast day, try to go when is seems the brightest. When is the best time of day to go? Anytime OTHER than around noontime (NOT from about 11:00am-1:00pm). Morning or early evening will usually produce best results.

Before you leave home, be sure that you have everything you will need. Take along a notebook and a pencil to record what you will be photographing. If you have an audiocassette, that would be even better. Of course, don't forget your camera and plenty of film!

The best type of film to use depends on the type of day. On a bright sunny day, ASA 100 would be best. If it is a cloudy day or the photos will be of a shady area, ASA 200 would be appropriate. On a heavy overcast day or in the early evening, ASA 400 would probably be better. These are only suggestions and are not written in stone. If you have any personal preferences that you are comfortable with, use them.


When you first get to the cemetery, it would be a good idea to get some background photos. If there is a gate or entrance, or if there is a church, get a shot of them. Once you locate the gravestones that you are looking for, take a wide shot of the gravesite area, showing other nearby stones. If you see any other family stones, get some close-up shots of them. These may not seem important now, but later on you may need the information and they could be very significant. You may not be able to get back so easily. So save yourself some grief. Take the photos now.

Photographing the gravestone itself can be very tricky depending on the light, but there are some ways to redirect the light. First a couple tips. 1) Always get some close-up shots. Be sure to fill the entire frame (90%) with the stone to ensure being able to read the inscriptions. If there are any pictures or special inscriptions, get some close shots of those as well. 2) Be sure to take notes about every photo as you take it (name, location, dates, etc.). Make sure you transfer these notes to the backs of the photos as soon as you get them back.

Often, the inscription will be difficult to read due to weathering or sometimes just because it was not a deep cut. When this occurs, the best way to read the inscription is to "skim" light across the face of the stone. See page 255 for details on how to do this.



Go to the house to ask permission to see the cemetery. Walk about 300 yards behind the house following a mowed dirt bike path up the hill to the cemetery.

Comments: We found a tombstone and footstone under a tree. The tombstone is for Rebecca J. Allen, who died in 1855. The footstone has M.M.A. inscribed on it. Records indicate that Civil War veteran, Smith Allen, is buried here, but we did not find his tombstone. PRIVATE PROPERTY. OBTAIN PERMISSION.







USING A MIRROR TO HELP READ A GRAVESTONE

Photographing the gravestone itself can be very tricky depending on the light. Often, the inscription will be difficult to read due to weathering or sometimes just because it was not a deep cut. When this occurs, the best way to read the inscription is to "skim" light across the face of the stone. In other words, you need to have the sun's light come in parallel to the face of the stone. This causes shadows to fill the inscriptions making them much easier to read. Occasionally, in the mornings and in the evenings, you will find this happening with no help; however, sometimes you need to bring the sun to the stone.

This can be done relatively easily with the use of a mirror and a piece of cardboard. There are three different circumstances where this can be done. 1) When the stone is in direct sunshine, but the sun is behind the face of the stone, take the mirror to the far edge of the stone (away from the sun) and angle the mirror so that the sunlight skims across the face of the stone. 2) When the stone is in direct sunshine and the sun is in front of the face of the stone, take the cardboard and block the sun from hitting the stone. This is when having another person with you really helps. Once the stone is in shade, take the mirror and skim the sunlight across the stone in the same manner as in the first situation. 3) If the stone is already in a shady area, you may have to bring the sun to the stone. You can do this by finding a place nearby where there is no shade and the sun is shining. Take the mirror to this spot and skim the sunlight across the face of the stone. Incredibly, this will work even when the sunlight is a hundred feet or more away. Obviously, these "mirror" techniques will only work when it is a sunny day.



The McPherson property was along the northern side of SR 331 (Flushing-Holloway Road) in Section 32, in an area that was strip-mined. WPA shows sites for 36 graves (9 across and 4 down). Slave Cemetery – Not in WPA Plat Book – Believed to have been the burial site of 15 to 20 slaves who died trying to escape to the north. The general area is east of TR 195 (Sechrest Road) in Section 9. It was on a hillside, possibly near a pond. We checked along this area and talked with property owners, but we were not successful in locating this cemetery.

KIRKWOOD TOWNSHIP

Acton Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (Index Only) – Revolutionary War records list Henry Acton as having died in Hendrysburg in 1842 and being buried in Acton Cemetery. We believe the cemetery is located in Kirkwood Township. An Acton descendant remembers a tombstone being in the area of I-70 and SR 800 where the old Acton Farm was located. It was near where the current gas station is on the SW corner of the intersection of I-70 and SR 800. The Acton Farm was sold and has been strip-mined.

Gilbert Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 82) - .15 acre – no est. date given – WPA directions are "near junction of SR 40 and SR 8." "Gilbert Private" is penciled in the margin. WPA shows sites for 180 graves (9 across and 20 down). This is in a stripmined area and cemetery may have been destroyed, but we have no confirmation of that. No veterans.

Lemon (Ryan) Cemetery – Not in WPA Plat Book - We were told there is one 1800s tombstone for Ryan Lemon on private property on the western side of the township. We have been unable to verify this information.

Moore Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (Index Only). This cemetery is listed in the WPA Index as being in Kirkwood Township. However, there is no map or any other information regarding it.

MEAD TOWNSHIP

Day Private Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 57) - .013 acre – est. about 1813 - WPA directions are "near SR 7." "Hutchson Farm" is penciled in the margin. WPA shows sites for 21 graves (3 across and 7 down). This cemetery may be in Section 6, west of Dilles Bottom, where a Day family lived years ago. However, we were not able to find it. No veterans.

Knight Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 57) - .009 acre – est. about 1832 - WPA directions are "near a township road off SR 7." "Creamer Farm - Pvt. Cem. - Mt. Liberty Ridge – Schiller Farm Cem." and "Cash Hill" are penciled in the margin. WPA shows sites for 10 graves (5 across and 2 down). War of 1812 veteran, Thomas Knight, rests here.

PEASE TOWNSHIP

Cooper Cemetery – Not in WPA Plat Book - Believed to be near Martins Ferry. The 1886 Plat Map shows Coopers living in both Section 20 and Section 26.

Kuckuck Private Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 60) - .0265 acre – est. about 1845 - WPA directions are ".75 miles from SR 7." WPA shows sites for 36 graves (3 across and 12 down). A Kuckuck descendant said he had a note from the courthouse stating the cemetery is 0.25 mile up from Patton Cemetery. He hunted in that area, but could not find anything. The 1880 Plat Book shows August Cuckuck living in the eastern part of Section 20 and William Cuckuck living in the eastern part of Section 24 (northern part of Martins Ferry). No veterans.

PULTNEY TOWNSHIP

Workman Cemetery #1 – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 15) - .014 acre – est. about 1837 - WPA directions are "north of Hardenstein Hill off Trumbull Street." WPA shows sites for 18 graves (3 across and 6 down). It is in the same general area as Nelson Cemetery, which is also off Trumbull Street in Bellaire. No veterans.

RICHLAND TOWNSHIP

Stonebreaker Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 74) - .002 acre – est. about 1840 - WPA directions are ".5 mile from CR 126." "On Parkinson Farm" is penciled in the margin. WPA shows sites for 40 graves (4 across and 10 down). The Stonebreaker family owned the entire Section 19. It is believed the cemetery was on a portion that was strip-mined. A local historian who had relatives buried there claims the cemetery is gone. We do not have confirmation of that. No veterans

SMITH TOWNSHIP

Mt. Harmony Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 114) - .115 acre – est. about 1814 - WPA directions are "North of TR (no name or number)." WPA shows sites for 120 graves (10 across and 20 down). No veterans.

Ramage Cemetery – Not in WPA Plat Book – Believed to be off of TR 250 (Coen Road) on the old Ramage property.

Ramsey Cemetery #1 – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 110) - .05 acre – est. about 1845 – WPA directions are "one-half mile north to Ramsey Farm." "Pvt. – Samuel Ramsey Farm" is penciled in the margin. WPA shows sites for 60 graves (5 across and 12 down). WPA

has two Ramsey Cemeteries in Smith Township. We believe the Jacob Ramsey Cemetery we found is Ramsey Cemetery #2. We were not able to locate Ramsey Cemetery #1. No veterans.

SOMERSET TOWNSHIP

St. Mary's Catholic Church Cemetery – This is not really a missing cemetery but sometimes appears on Missing Cemeteries lists. St. Mary's Catholic Church is in Temperanceville. However, the cemetery is about a half mile west in Beaver Township, Noble County. Start in Temperanceville at the intersection of SR 379 (Temperanceville Highway) and CR 132 (Temperanceville Road). Take CR 132 west about 0.5 mile. The cemetery is on the right. See Yarnall's transcription (pp. 513-525).

UNION TOWNSHIP

Barkcamp Cemetery – Not in WPA Plat Book – Two separate reliable sources told us they saw tombstones in Barkcamp State Park many years ago. One man saw the stones while hunting. The other man saw them while surveying the area for a road through the hunting section in the northeast corner of the park. Barkcamp officials say they have never seen any tombstones. However, if any are found they will place the site on their park map and maintain the area.

Campbell Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 122) - .05 acre – no est. date given - WPA directions are "1.25 miles east of CR 29 and 1 mile north of CR 28." WPA shows sites for 54 graves (6 across and 9 down). No veterans.

Lady Bend Hill Cemetery – Not in WPA Plat Book – We have heard several reports of a couple tombstones near the end of Lady Bend Hill. This is where US 40 (National Road) dead-ends at CR 100 (Egypt North Road). It is on the border of Union and Kirkwood Townships. The tombstones are believed to be around a highway billboard overlooking I-70 on the northeast corner of the intersection of US 40 and CR 100. The property owner looked several times for them, but he said he did not find anything.

Methodist Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (Index Only) - This cemetery is listed in the WPA Index, but has no map or any other information regarding it.

Pidgin Cemetery – Not in WPA Plat Book - The cemetery was about 2 miles east of Morristown and slightly south of National Road. It was near the Quaker Academy and Meeting House. Edward Milner is buried there. In later years, William Lantz stacked the tombstones against his fence. The above information was obtained from <u>Belmont</u> <u>County History of Facts & Traditions</u>, p. 27.

WARREN TOWNSHIP

Clear Ridge Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 82) – .35 acre – no est. date given. WPA gives no directions. WPA shows sites for 400 graves (10 across and 38 down, plus 20 plots across the lane to the west). No veterans.

O'Dowds Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 53) - .336 acre – est. about 1833 – WPA gives no directions. "Pvt." and "Ross Hamp Farm" are penciled in the margin. (Difficult to read. May be Ross <u>Stamp</u> or <u>Stump</u>.) WPA shows sites for 40 graves (4 across and 10 down). No veterans. Some people believe this is an alternate name for Old Ireland Cemetery. We have no confirmation of that.

WASHINGTON TOWNSHIP

Burkhart Cemetery #1 – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 65) - .006 acre – est. about 1816 – WPA directions are "north of SR 148." WPA shows sites for 8 graves (2 across and 4 down). No veterans.

Lander Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 68) - .023 acre – est. about 1838 – WPA gives no directions. "Lander Pvt." is penciled in the margin. WPA shows sites for 24 graves (4 across and 6 down). No veterans.

McGeary Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 71) - .037 acre – est. about 1830 – WPA directions are ".5 mile south of TR (unnamed)." "W.H. McGeary Private" is penciled in the margin. WPA shows sites for 40 graves (4 across and 10 down). No veterans.

Rock Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 67) - .16 acre – est. about 1830 - WPA directions are ".5 mile south of SR 148." "Rock Farm Private Cem." is penciled in the margin. WPA shows sites for 15 graves (3 across and 5 down). No veterans.

YORK TOWNSHIP

Duvall Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 120) - .03 acre – est. about 1847 – WPA directions are ".5 mile south of CR 125 Pleasant Hill Road and 3 mile west of SR 7." Believed to be off of CR 56 (Mt. Victory Road). Revolutionary War veteran, Col. E. Duvall, is buried here. WPA shows sites for 180 graves (12 across and 15 down). No veterans. (A Nancy Duvall lived in Sec. 8, which is at the southern end of CR 56.)

Richardson Cemetery – Listed in WPA Plat Book (p. 120) - .002 acre – est. about 1845 – WPA directions are "3 miles west of SR 7 and south of CR 125." "Private" is penciled in the margin. WPA shows sites for 10 graves (2 across and 5 down). No veterans.
