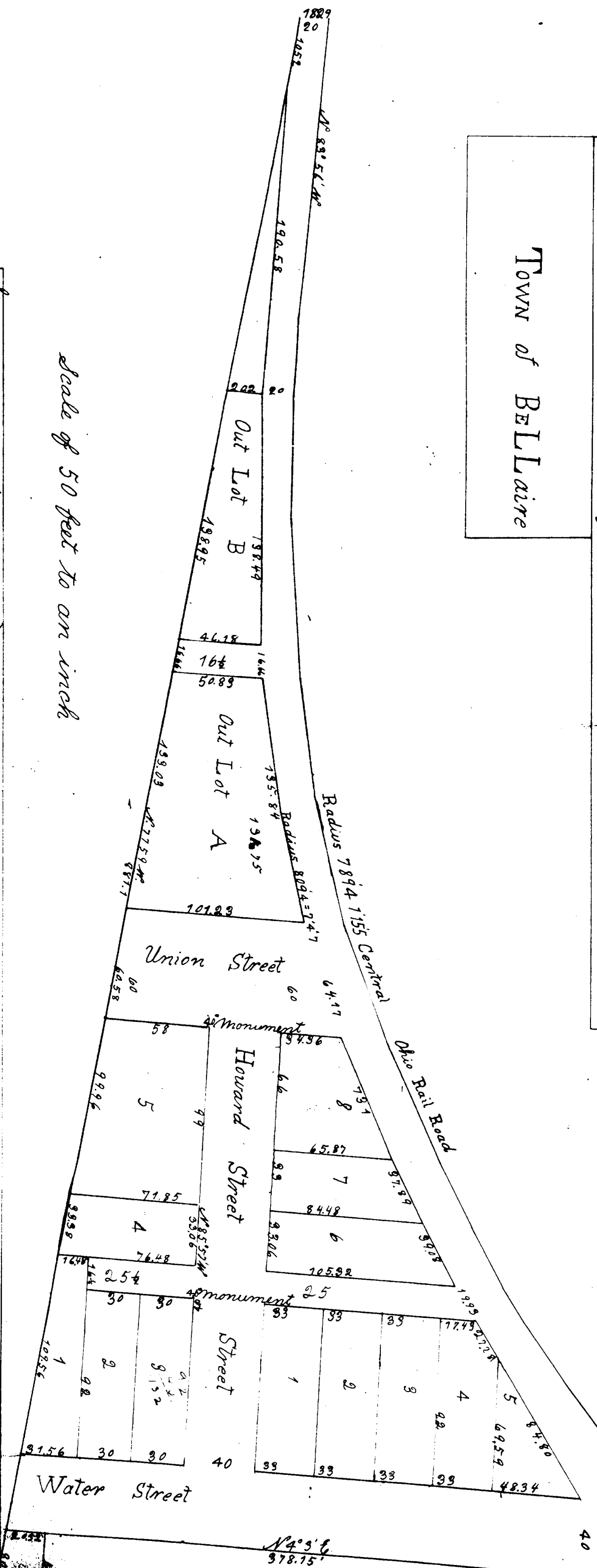


Map of the First Morris Farm Addition

I, S. G. Putnam, a competent surveyor for that purpose of Belmont County, Ohio, do hereby certify that the above plat of the First Morris Farm Addition to the City of Bellaire, was made by me, in accordance with an accurate survey of the premises also made by myself and that the same boundaries and particulars and accurate description of the streets, alleys, in lots, Out Lots and fractional lots of said Addition, showing by exact distances and monuments their boundaries and extent together with the number of the lots and what the blocks are divided and the streets, alleys and roads standing or founding the same, and the red border there being no public ground or lots of land designated the points on the above plat, situated of said premises, by my direction has planted and fixed good and sufficient stone monuments marked with iron, from which to make future surveys, both of them being permanent four feet high from the line of the south side of Union Street, one of them four feet high from the line of the north side of Union Street. The other four feet high from the line of the east side of the alley, between said streets. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand this fifth day of September, 1856.
